
# Launch of the ROCKWOOL Foundation's Productivity & Prosperity Unit

The objective of the unit is to assist in reinforcing the competitive strength and economic sustainability of Denmark and of Europe as a whole.






Conference: Country versus Town – is Denmark splitting in half? At a conference, new research from the ROCK-WOOL Foundation turned the spotlight on the current and future challenges that small societies, far removed from the larger towns, are facing with regard to depopulation and a rise in the proportion of elderly citizens.

Kaare Dybvad Bek, Minister for Immigration and Integration, shared his opinions on the topic, not only as a government minister, but also as the author of the book entitled *Udkantsmyten* (The Myth of the Periphery), which centred on the importance of the provinces to society.

Albert Saiz, a professor at MIT and an expert in urban economics, presented his predictions regarding the future of Denmark against the background of international experience.



## Unhappiness among young people is not permanent

"Generation unhappiness" has been the codename for the present cohorts of young people, and for many years the consensus in the public debate has been that young people are unhappier than ever before. For this reason, numerous programmes and initiatives have been launched in an attempt to deal with this key societal challenge.

However, in the autumn of 2024 the ROCKWOOL Foundation published a study that painted a more finely shaded picture. Because even though a large number of young people are, in fact, unhappy, it is only a transitory phase for a large majority of them.

The study highlights the need for ensuring that the actions and initiatives taken by society are based on solid knowledge so as to make the most appropriate use of the funds available.

## Is the punishment system in Denmark fair?

In April, the ROCKWOOL Foundation published the results from two new studies – the development in youth criminality and the use of alternative forms of punishment, namely: community service and electronic ankle bracelets.

Alternative forms of punishment are much cheaper than imprisonment, result in lower criminal recidivism and cause less disruption in relation to family and friends, for example.

Nevertheless, the fact that differences exist regarding who is permitted to serve "alternative" sentences challenges the concept of equality before the law. In practice, this means that different sentences may be handed down for the same type of crime, depending on who the perpetrator is. Convicted criminals who can be described as "resource-rich" are more likely to receive an "alternative" punishment than their less resource-rich counterparts.






### The opioid crisis - what are the facts?

In the run-up to the government's new political initiative to reverse the increasing abuse of opioids, the ROCKWOOL Foundation published a major study that revealed the use of opioids among 15–19-year-olds.

The figures were referred to on multiple occasions during the debate and showed, for example, that opioids have become the

second-most popular substance among the youngest users, exceeded only by hashish.

On the other hand, the study firmly established that only 4 percent of these young people had taken opioids within the past 12 months; so even though the development is concerning, there is not yet a large number of users in this age group.








Conference on challenges facing men with regard to health and schooling In October, the ROCKWOOL Foundation turned the spotlight on the fact that men are losing ground on women, particularly with regard to health and education.

Richard Reeves, researcher and award-winning author, talked about the educational challenges boys and men are facing, and made the point that while changes in traditional women's roles have been developing rapidly for decades, men have found it much harder to adapt.

Dorthe Bleses, Professor at Aarhus University, talked about gender differences in children's language, while Svend Aage Madsen, PhD and psychologist, shared his knowledge of differences in health behaviour among elderly men and women.

The ROCKWOOL Foundation remains actively involved in this agenda, supporting an initiative under the leadership of Psychologist Svend Aage Madsen, PhD, which is intended to help reduce excess mortality among vulnerable men.
